JUDGE'S TIPS and COMMENTS

- Australian Bush Poetry has Rhyme and Rhythm, VERY IMPORTANT;
- Create images in the phrasing of words;
- Read your poetry out loud to see if it flows;
- Punctuation IS important as the reader must be aware of where to pause for effect;
- Formatting stanzas assists with the flow of the poem;
- Beginning capture the readers attention; maintain a strong story line; finish with a powerful ending;
- Monitor the length of the poem is is too long to maintain the readers interest; also remember length is relative for printing;
- "I know some writers find me a little pedantic with regards consistent metre and rhyme but these ingredients are what separates us from the writers of blank or free verse. We owe it to the pioneers of this form of verse that modern writers use consistent metre and rhyme. Metre and rhyme are not ends in themselves but they create a rhythm that allows all readers to follow, uninterrupted, the ideas and emotions that are being expressed by the writer. Inconsistent metre and rhyme disrupts the flow of what is being presented and does a disservice to the contents of the poem." Noel Stallard OAM
- "In judging, subjectivity can be broad and not everyone has the same tastes and likes. So we look to a criteria for rhyming poetry that includes the fundamentals of grammar (allowing for Aussie vernacular) as well as punctuation. Not all rhymes end on the endline, so punctuation would clarify enjambment. Metre or rhythm needs to be consistent. If any of these elements are out of sync, the piece would hang or catch in the reading –particularly out loud." Manfred Vijars
