## \*\*\*\*\* PRESIDENTS REPORT. \*\*\*\*\*\*

Well 1995 has been a fantastic year for Bush Poetry, Tamworth was a great success with the competition and the attendance at the Longyard for the poets breakfast, and then to top it off our entries in the procession of three floats. The procession was watched by a huge crowd of Country Music fans from all parts of Australia. I have had reports of club members returning home and recommending the Bush Poets be included in their future festivals.

The Swaggies Walk from Cairns to Brisbane opened up huge exposure for Bush Poetry as the media in all towns we performed in gave us great articles in their local papers. We were covered on the T.V. news, and personal interviews on radio, Some of the stations ran hourly ads for a week as well as the live interviews with the members.

I would like to personally thank Bob Magor and John Philipson for their part in this very hectic daily round— as each day was full on with media exposure and organizing the performances. We performed at up to three schools a day, audiences ranged from 16 children or the entire school at some venues two schools came together to pack the parade ground with a sea of of young Australian faces. The children were from 5 to 18 years, they and the teachers were thrilled with the Australian Heritage Theme of the show and invited us back anytime.

A name that kept coming up was Mark Gliori who has done a wonderful job in promoting Bush Poetry. Charlee Marshall is another poet who has made a mark on the school children. They would proudly come up and say they knew Mark and Charlee. They are both to be congratulated for their efforts. In all we performed for some 12thousand children in the various towns we visited on the tour.

We had to work very hard to get a crowd at some of the adult shows and though some were disappointing others were very rewarding.

People who had never heard Bush Poetry performed by todays poets were thrilled and likened it to the good old school days.



## Queensland News.

Winton. Qld. 6 - 17th April. 1995

The Inaugural Bush Poetry Championships held in conjunction with the Waltzing Matilda Centenary Celebrations in Winton Qld, from the 6th to the 17th of April, were no less than a resounding success.

After twelve days of non stop partying, Country Music, Billy Tea and Bush Poetry, Winton will never be the same again. Over fourteen thousand visitors passed through the tiny outback town, which boasts a population of only eleven hundred residents, as part of the Centenary Celebrations.

Some eighty eight Poets from all over Australia were in Winton to compete in the series of heats in six different Performance categories.

Carmel and Jay Randle of Preston, Qld. organised and conducted the competitions in their usual faultless style.

Heats were conducted over eight days of the Festival in Novice, Junior, Ladies, Original, Traditional, and in a special section of **A.B.** (Banjo) Paterson verse.

Semi-finalists were judged from the heats, and no less than thirty six challenges were set for the Finals which were held on the Good Friday night, in the big 'Clancys Marquee.' Seasoned performers helped soothe the nerves of many a novice as the atmosphere became tense in the final showdown, as competitors and audience alike awaited the final results. Judges, commenting later on the closeness and the quality of the Finals, could not but help noticing the distinct friendliness and convivial rivalry betweent the Bush Poets.

## The Man From Ironbark.

One of the big features of the Winton Festival was undoubtedly the Man from Ironbark performance held daily at the Winton Club where Geoffrey Graham, from Bealba, Vic. starred in his own scripted show dealing with the life and writings of A.B.(Banjo) Paterson.

Both song and verse took the audience through a sensitive, sometimes humerous, and quite emotional range of the works of the great author. Audience participation, especially in the Barbershop routine, was well received and left them calling for more.

It was standing room only for every show and additional performances had to be scheduled for a further two nights to cater for those who were turned away, as well as for the locals who were too busy during the twelve days of the Festival to attend.

One of the Highlights of the Winton

Festival was without any doubt the Bush Poets State of Origin, where

Queensland Captain, John Major valiantly led his team, in an
unsuccessful bid to outdo the New South Wales team led by Captain

Frank Daniel. This now makes it a two to nil score as the
Cockroaches were outright victors in June last year in the clash with the
Canetoads at the Longyard during the Fireside Festival in Tamworth.

Perhaps the sunshine state was in need of their old Captain, Charlee Marshall, who was busy keeping things in order at the National Folk Festival in Canberra.

An attempt at bribing the **Mullumbimby Bloke** to play for his side saw John lose points from the Referee, a Norwegian lady by the name of **Taura** (no Bull.)

The eventual scores were N.S.W.—110.75. Qld. 109.50. Only a lady like Taura could come up with scores like this in Football-Poetry. Her summary of the whole game afterwards, in order to explain her reasoning, was by no means arguable.

'She was bloody right,' so the N.S.W. Captain agreed.

Jim Haynes. Perhaps the busiest man of the whole Festival would have to be the one and only Jim Haynes who brought his 'Best of the Bush' show to Winton. His Troupeconsisted of Mark Gliori (Warwick), Ray Essary (Mullumbimby), Marion Fitzgerald (North Star), Shirley Friend(Brisbane) and Bobby Miller (Mungar).

They played to full houses for five Poets Breakfasts and to two evening concerts in 'Clancys Marquee.'

The second evening concert saw a pageant of stars as they led up to the introduction of 'Banjo' himself, as portrayed by Geoffrey Graham. Marion Fitzgerald invited 'Banjo' to 'waltz with her' in a recitation specially written for the occasion. Other Australian Characters were played by Gary Fogarty, Carmel Randle and Frank Daniel.

Along with Centenary Patron, Slim Dusty and Ted Egan, Jim also entertained the Prime Minister, Mr. Paul Keating, Queensland Premier, Mr. Wayne Goss, Queensland Governor, Mrs. Leneen Ford and local Politicians and dignitaries at the Official Dinner at the North Gregory Hotel.

Clancys Marquee. A huge red, white and blue Marquee set up in the western end of

the Main Street of Winton, was the venue for much of the action as far as Bush Poetry went.

As well as the Poetry Competition, a number of Poets breakfasts were held, along with the State of Origin, a bout of Tall Tale Telling and a Poets Brawl. The poets brawl is an event where poets are asked to complete a verse in less than one minute, on any healthy subject at all, with humour naturally being the stem of all arguments.

The Poets Brawl in Winton was won by Frank Daniel of Canowindra, N.S.W.

One feature of the Breakfasts at the Marquee was the inclusion of a **Rhyming Romp**, which was devised and set up by **Carmel Randle**.

In this section of the entertainment, the audience was asked to show their own talent and submit finishing lines to verses, limericks and/or make alterations to existing poems by some of our great authors.

This was conducted over two Poets Breakfasts and was very popular and enthusiastically received by the big crowds. A selection of the best four liners were asked to perform their own works which added more fun to the mornings.

## The Spirit of Waltzing Matilda.

The ABC radio network conducted a written poetry competition to honor the work of 'Banjo' Paterson. This was organised through the **Peter Jeppeson** programme which is aired each morning from 11 am to Noon.

The Australian Bush Poets are very proud of the fact that one of their peers in Mark Gliori, of Warwick Qld. was the overall winner with his poem 'Swaggie.' Congratulations to Marco for his fine effort.

The Junior section of this contest was won by twelve year old Alissa Marrie.

Apart from Banjo Paterson verse, it was quite obvious that the most popular writers during the Winton Celebrations were the likes of Bruce Simpson, Will Ogivie, Robert Raftery, and Col 'Blue the Shearer' Wilson.

Much of their verse was recited by Performers such as John Philipson, Gary Fogarty, Marion Fitzgerald and Trish Anderson. A fitting tribute to our great writers.

Gary Fogarty. Champion Poet.

Queensland Poet, Gary Fogarty would be without a doubt the most deserved winner of the Australian Bush Poetry Championships. A dedicated family man, a natural gentleman, a true Bushman, and a talented writer and reciter, Gary quickly gained the respect of his peers when he hit the Bush Poetry scene about eighteen months ago. During this time he has won on numerous occasions or placed well into the finals at many competitions throughout Queensland and N.S.W.

Gary won three major titles at the Waltzing Matilda Centenary Celebrations, taking out the Humerous and the Serious sections as well as the A.B.(Banjo) Paterson Award.

During the past two years Gary has worked as a Rural Family Support Worker, based in Goondiwindi. Following the Easter break he took up a new position in Millmerrin as a Community Support Worker, which expands his client base enabling him to help the whole community and not just the rural people.

## Features of Winton Celebration.

Most notable at Winton was the number of new faces coaxed to the Poetry scene. Of the eighty two competing Poets, fifty were new to the ABPA, not being seen previously at any of our venues.

Some were obviously very experienced perfectionist performers from another genre. Some were expressing at last their life long love of Poetry.

All exhibited the talent and dedication that we know has kept the art form in Australia alive for the past two hundred years.

We will have to work harder and place more emphasis on encouraging younger performers to our junior section before next year.

Another major feature of Winton was the unstinting cooperation between the Bush Poets. The organisation of these inaugural Championships was a venture into unknown depths and uncharted seas.

While much preparation could be and was done in advance to deal with the expected features, navigating successfulluy through unexpected hazards was only achieved with the cheerful co-operation of so many of the stalwarts of the bush poetry movement.

People like Frank Daniel, Bob Miller, Marion Fitzgerald, Jim Haynes, Gary Fogarty, Ray Essary, John Philipson, Mark Gliori, John Major, Carmel Randle and Ron Bates — who gave of their talents so freely to compere and or entertain.

The consistant 'behind the scenes work' of Jay Randle Carmel Randle, Tora Tarlinton and Alan Palmer coupled with spontaneous assistance from others too numerous to mention made a world of difference to our steerage through the uncharted seas.

Perhaps the biggest feature of Winton will be the spin-off generated by the new awareness of Bush Poetry as an entertainment art form.

So many travellers had their first taste of Bush Poetry in Winton and came back time and time again to the different sessions.

They've now moved on to spread the word!

**Judging** a competition at Championship levels is never easy. Sixteen different judges officiated over the seven days of thirty two competitions, with three Judges officiating at each event.

The results in each were a consensus of three opinions — really the only way to go!

To these sixteen worthy ladies and gentlemen, we extend our heartfelt thanks.

## Winton. (Cont'd)

The numbers contesting the various sections of the Winton Championships were as follows.

Thirty four in the Open Serious section, Twenty nine in the Open Humerous, Seventeen in the Ladies section, Fourty four in the Novice, and two in the Junior section.

Twenty six were from the ABPA.

A.B.P.A. member, **Noel Cutler** of Milawa Vic. had a busy time at the Sydney Royal Easter Show. Having to make a decision as to whether to make the long journey to Winton for the Centenary or head for Sydney to contest the Australian Whip Cracking Titles, Noel opted for the Easter Show.

Noel was successful in taking out the National Title. Congratulations from the Bush Poets, Noel.

Also keeping the tradition alive, Noel has been busy setting up a tour of Victoria and Tasmania for Bush Poets in the South.

Members of Noels Troupe are: **Geoffrey Graham**, who entertained to full houses with his 'Man From Ironbark' show at Winton. **Bob Magor** from Myponga in South Australia, **Frank Daniel** of Canowindra, N.S.W.

The Victorian tour will kick off at **Bealba** on the 6th. of June, followed by **Charlton** - 7th. **Bendigo** - 8th. Shepparton - 9th. **Milawa** - 10th. and **Albury** on the 11th. From Albury they will travel to Tasmania where they have a further Six venues to cover, before returning to home soil on the 18th.

Whispers in the wind have it that big things are in order for the **Toowoomba Festival of Flowers** during the last week of **September**. Some new venues have been chosen for this year and a lot of changes have been made from last years programme.

More news will be to hand about this Festival next month.

The Australian Bush Music Festival Inc. Glen Innes has announced that it will be going full strength on the October Long Weekend, which means it will be piggy-backing with the Toowoomba Festival this year. Poets travelling about should be able to take advantage of both Festivals. Glen Innes again will be catering for the growing band of spoken-word fans with a large entourage of Poets and Raconteurs who continually delight the large audiences they draw, particularly at the Poets Breakfasts.

## National Folk Festrval.

The National Folk Festival held in Canberra over Easter brought Poets from almost every State in Australia to the National Capital. Poets and Poetry abounded, with a big emphasis on Bush Poetry, the 'spoken-word'has certainly taken some big steps forward over the last few years.

Each day saw at least four different shows featuring Poetry, from the Poets Breakfasts in the mornings, to late night shows in the 'Attic,' the' Wine Bar' etc.

Among those presenting shows were Col (Blue the Shearer) Wilson, Keith McHenry, Leigh Brown, Jan Lewis, Geoff Page, Robin Davidson, Jackie Bridle and the Stand -up Poets (David hallett, S. Sorenson and David Heilpern.)

The Poets Breakfasts were very popular and it was very difficult to give everyone a turn on stage. Some of the necomers showed great talent both, as writers and as performers.

The variety of Poetry was enormous, with excellent Bush Poetry at one end of the spectrum through to the most free-falling, obscure intellectual gymnastics at the other, with every shade between. While we may not enjoy every style, we must concede that they all have a legitimate place, especially at a Folk Festival.

The only sour note attached to the spoken-word at the Festival was one particular afternoon session which failed to be as advertised. Many parents took their children to this show, but beat a hasty retreat during the first performers spot when they discovered that the favorite letter with which to start a word was 'F,' and the Poets topics included masterbation etc. If this show had been appropriately named, children would not have been taken along.

It was a shame, particularly as this fellow was to be followed by one of the countrys best Bush Poets whom the children never got to see.

On a brighter note, **Charlee Marshall** was here, there, and everywhere, accompanied by his good wife **Beryl** and a young

Lady whom Charlee introduced variously as 'Theresa,' 'Melissa,' 'Esmerelda' and 'Samantha.'

Another National regular, and past Reciters Award winner, was Col Newsome of Glen Innes, seventy eight years and still going strong.

The winner of the Reciters Award at this years Poets Dinner was Simon Campbell from Queensland, making his first visit to the National. This precedent was set last year when it was won by Leigh Brown of Yass N.S.W.

Over all, it was a great Fesitval, and the spoken word really held its' own against all comers.

The Bush Christening. On Easter Sunday, hundreds of people gathered at the Combo Waterhole some 160 Kays north of Winton, on the Diamantina River where Jim Haynes and other Bush Poets entertained an audience seated on the shade of Coolibah Trees.

Following a brief church service, twelve children from the local area and as far away as Longreach, were baptised by **Father Bill**, in an authentic **Bush Christening**.

Many stayed for a picnic and some swam in the muddy waters of the Billabong as the afternoon shadows lengthened.

Maybe some were sitting in the same spot where Sarah Riley, Christina McPherson and Banjo picnicked with friends one hundred years before.

Transportation methods were certainly nothing like the horse and buggy days of 1895, with no less than nine aeroplanes landing in the open paddock nearby, and a multitiude of campervans, mobile homes and late model sedans as well as the old favourite of the bushmen the Land Cruiser.

### Let's look at ...

### JOE BLOGG'S ADJUDICATION SHEET.

(Please turn to the CENTRE of this Newsletter where you will find a photocopy of one of Joe Blogg's recent Adjudication Sheets from the

Inaugural Championships in Winton.

IF the printer has managed to photocopy it WITHOUT REDUCING ITS SIZE, each of the lines will measure 13.3 centimetres, or 133 millimetres, or 5 and three-eight inches...depending on which ruler you use!)

You are looking at a GRAPH...that is, a VISUAL REPRESENTATION of a series of values. Representation of facts and figures GRAPHICALLY, that is, in GRAPH FORM, is universally accepted nowadays as the most readily understood method of presentation.

This Adjudication Sheet is a LINE GRAPH. Values allocated for each of the eight CRITERIA (i.e. standards to be judged) being assessed are indicated by the Adjudicator placing an agreed mark or symbol (in this case, a small tick) ANYWHERE along the CONTINUUM (i.e. the continuous extent or whole line).

IF WE MEASURE IN MILLIMETRES and avoid measurements smaller than one millimetre, there are ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-THREE PLACES WHERE AN ADJUDICATOR CAN PLACE HIS ASSESSMENT.

You may say, if you wish, that EACH CRITERIA IS MARKED OUT OF 133! ... or, working in CENTIMETRES, that EACH CRITERIA IS MARKED OUT OF 13.3! ....or, working in INCHES, that EACH CRITERIA IS MARKED OUT OF FIVE and THREE-EIGHTHS!

Now, it doesn't matter which of those figures you use, AS LONG AS EVERYONE IS MARKED OUT OF THE SAME NUMBER!

The old-fashioned tradition is to mark everything out of ten. In the days when the population was much smaller, and competitive Events not so competitive, TEN was an easy, uniform number. (You have 6 or 7 Competitors to sort out...one ends up on 9, one on 8, two on 7, one on 6, one on 5, and one on 4. ALREADY YOU HAVE A PROBLEM...a tie for 3rd! So, you resort to HALF-MARKS. Now you have TWENTY possible places where an Adjudicator can select his assessment!)

Consider.... if you need twenty "stops" between 0 and 10 to successfully separate 7 Competitors, how many do you need to separate 82 (with up to 44 in one Event)? Even using 13.3 centimetres or 133

millimetres, we STILL had one unsplittable tie!

Please take another look at Joe Blogg's Adjudication Sheet. Elsewhere in the Newsletter, you will find a reprint of the INFORMATION FOR JUDGES sheet handed to each Adjudicator each time they sat down to assess a session. (A Sample Assessment Sheet and full explanation of it was also handed to EACH ADJUDICATOR IN ADVANCE OF THE COMPETITION so they could clarify any concerns before the Heats began.)

Please take a moment to read the ASSESSMENT SHEET IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE INFORMATION SHEET. Note the double weighting given to RAPPORT (i.e. harmonious or sympathetic relationship)...

a. Is for the PERCIEVED AUDIENCE REACTION (in the opinion of that

Judge) (CONTINUED OVER)

- b. Is for the JUDGE'S OWN REACTION to the Performance. RAPPORT is double-weighted as that is the most important feature of Performance.
  - So, what happened to Joe Blogg's Assessment Sheet next?

A Scribe took it, and FOUND THE AVERAGE MARK OF THE EIGHT SYMBOLS ALLOCATED BY THAT JUDGE. In this case, working in Centimetres, the AVERAGE MARK WOULD BE...

9.1 centimetres....(or 91 millimetres)
(Note that "9.1" equates with "Highly Recommended Work tending towards Excellence") The Scribe marked this value on the BOTTOM LINE (which is DARKER than the rest!) He/She then took THE OTHER TWO SHEETS FROM THE OTHER TWO JUDGES, totalled them up in the same fashion, then AVERAGED THE THREE and transferred the AVERAGE OF THE THREE to a final sheet which then showed quite clearly the COMPARATIVE TOTAL VALUE OF EACH COMPETITOR. (Perhaps you could leave this as a TOTAL of the 3 and you would have a final MARK OUT OF 40! It makes no difference!)

I would like to draw your attention to TWO matters here...

1. Occasionally, an Adjudicator CHOSE NOT TO MARK A COMPETITOR ON A PARTICULAR ASPECT OF HIS/HER WORK. eg. If they felt they were distracted during your PREAMBLE, they might choose not to allocate a tick on the PREAMBLE LINE. When this happened, the Scribe CHECKED WITH THE ADJUDICATOR CONCERNED, then totalled, and DIVIDED BY THE NUMBER OF LINES THAT WERE ASSESSED. Your AVERAGE mark was, therefore, equitable.

2. The adjudication was the AVERAGE OF THREE OPINIONS. Often one Adjudicator particularly liked one person's Performance, but that same performance did not catch the attention of the other two Adjudicators to the same extent. Therefore, no matter how brilliant the one Adjudicator found that performance, unless the other two agreed, its AVERAGE assessment naturally enough was not "Brilliant"! At least, three Adjudicators is a much fairer way of determining Champions than being reliant on the "One Man's Opinion On One Day" model!

This Format for assessing the Performing Arts is NOT NEW! Some twenty years ago now, Speech & Drama, Theatre, and Music became assessable High School Subjects in Queensland, counting towards University Entrance. With literally thousands of Year 12 students competing each year for fewer than a hundred Tertiary Places -- and the vast majority of them studying these subjects because they are particularly talented in the field -- a practical, fair, and equitable way of assessment was sought, and this model developed. In Schools, a FIFTH (lower) Level of Achievement is often used, and NO MARKS ARE ISSUED!

Let me address a couple of statements made to me at and since Winton...

- - "The Competitor's name should be on the judging sheet". (CONTINUED OVER)

Why? The Judges are there to assess the Performance they hear that day, not how well-known that person is, or what they might have heard of that person elsewhere! (After all, they might have heard something BAD!) Ideally, NO NAMES SHOULD BE USED AT ALL!....
Only NUMBERS!

3. "I don't think that the Comperes should introduce Competitors by saying what Awards they have won, and what Honours they have received (example...Wall of Fame at the Longyard). The poor Competitors who HAVEN'T yet had these triumphs don't get the build-up!"

Fair Comment! Sometime in the future, we'll need a definate Policy on these matters for our Championships!

- 4. "Two Judges told me that mine was the best....."

  Unprofessional conduct? Or a slip in memory by an Adjudicator when the Assessment Sheets did not manage to verify the statement?
- 5. "He was only .3 behind me. Surely he was next!"
  He was .3 on a scale of 1 to 13.3. He was 3 marks on more-realistic scale of 1 to 133, and, with the very high standard of Competitors at the Championships, there were often 3 or 4 within ".3 on a 1 13.3 scale"!
- 6. "I had the best poem. The Judges said so!"

  Obviously, on balance, someone else compensated for their weaker poem by doing a much better Performance!
- 7. "I spoke to all the Judges about my performance...."

  PLEASE read "Conditions of Entry Rule 14"!

  People who approach Judges after the Competition make it hard for Competition Organisers to find suitable Adjudicators! If, as is the custom in Eisteddfaux, the (ONE) Adjudicator stands at the end of each Competition and gives the Competitors a GENERAL OUTLINE of the problems observed in that competition, some broad hints may be gleaned, but the place to LEARN is BEFORE you come to the Competition! Seek the help of a knowledgeable, honest friend or willing fellow-poet! Find a Speech Teacher! Realise that perfection in Performance is an elusive goal!

You may be the BEST PERFORMANCE POET in your AREA.....but Australia is a big place, with many areas!

- 8. "That Poem was not ALL Traditional or not ALL Original either! It was a combination of both!" The requirements at Winton were "ORIGINAL OR TRADITIONAL" in ONE CLASS. This is the first time that that format has been set...as the result of a MOTION AT THE A.G.M. of the A.B.P.A.. The Adjudicators had no ruling to disqualify such a performance. It wasn't covered in "Conditions of Entry". Ostensibly, it fitted the requirements of the Category. Perhaps this is another point where we need a definate Policy set for the future!
- I hope this clarifies the questions you would have liked to ask about the Assessment Sheets. Yes, they WERE the same for Heats, Semi-Finals, and Finals! No, they are NOT Copyright! Feel free to use or adapt the system for YOUR next Competition! Perhaps you could print YOUR sheet with the millimetres already marked along the lines?

Some spare Doodle paper.

We would ask our Judges to please work independently.

What are we looking for?

Entertainment!

Good clean honest Bush Poetry!

Please don't let the technicalities of Poetry stand in the way of the ORIGINAL CHARACTER OF BUSH PERFORMANCE -- which grew in response to the need for entertainment among drovers and settlers in isolated situations.

While the rules are "as stated", it is not the intention to let the rules overrun the performance in importance. For example, stated time limit is seven minutes for Open and Ladies, five minutes for Novice and Junior. If a competitor is over time, but nearly finished, don't "bell" him/her off! Just take the length into account when marking. (This can be done in the "Choice of Poem" mark.) With a very long boring performance, use the bell.

A general guide to the content of the various criteria would be:

**PREAMBLE** .. Any spoken introduction to the Poem **CHOICE OF POEM** .. Its suitability for performance, the occasion, the Category. Is it <u>Australian Bush</u>? Non-offensive? Within the time limits?

**START OF THE POEM** .. A bright opening style? Grabs our attention immediately?

**BODY OF THE POEM** .. Is the interest sustained throughout? Content follows logically? Etc...

CONCLUSION .. Ending satisfactorily delivered? Punchline

**AUDIBILITY** .. Could you clearly hear and understand this performance?

AUDIENCE RAPPORT ..

- a) Did the audience enjoy this?
- b) Did you enjoy this?

The Scribe will be totalling your decisions, and will advise you of the end result before handing it on to the Compere.

### HAPPY LISTENING!

To ALL A.B.P.A. Members particularly EXEC. OFFICERS

Thank you for giving me the chance to sit in judgement on your very talented selves and others during your great Festival. It is hoped my endeavours were appreciated, and that I did not treat people unfairly or harshly. You gave a good deal of pleasure to a lot of people and you all should be proud of your performances.

One aspect of the whole show offends my sense of justice and good public image. I refer to the practice of any judge being empanneled by any <u>SINGLE</u> member of the apparent administrative staff, and then such a member to <u>Perform</u> before that appointed judge. I consider judges should be appointed by persons of Executive STATUS, and that only people of some long experience with the subject under judgement should be recognised as capable of being judges.

Persons lacking "hands-on" experience as WRITERS and/or performers do not please me as fellow judges. Judges should be asked for a COMMENT on his scoring sheet.

Competitors should remember that they are appearing as entertainers, NOT EGO TRIPPERS, and the paying audience are, I think, entitled to a <u>WIDER</u> display of each contestants repertoire.

It is not encouraging to hear, as I did, members of the audience commenting on the repitition of some poems. Perhaps it could be remembered by everyone, whilst I understand we ALL like to do ONE or TWO poems we do WELL, such poems can become 'MECHANICAL and TECHNICAL' if used too frequently. Audience comments bears this out.

I would also like to see you give some thought to <u>ballotting</u> of MULTIPLE CHOICES nominated by entrants. Surely some way could be found to avoid future disappointment for audiences and <u>some</u> judges. The foregoing is not intended to destroy, rather to improve and strengthen our image.

Lastly, I am forced to travel early AM 15/4/95 to Townsville for medical reasons, hence my inability to personally appear before you. However, I am handing this letter to your very capable and poorly acknowledged PRESIDENT. Hopefully he will bring this before you all.

Next time you are involved in any formal functions such as the dinner MR BOSTOCK was NOT invited to, please do not allow such an unpardonable wrong to be repeated.

## In REPLY TO Mr. KELLY DIXON'S LETTER....

NOTE: At the General Meeting of A.B.P.A. held in Tamworth, June 1994, a Sub-Committee of Ron Selby, Mark Gliori, and the President, Mr. Bostock (ex-officio) was formed to organise the Inaugural A.B.P.A. Championships in Winton at the Centenary Celebrations for Waltzing Matilda. Later in the year, Mark withdrew because of travelling commitments, and I was co-opted to take his place.

Our Mid-December 1994 Sub-Committee Meeting carried the motion that any person involved in running the Championships would still be able to compete. The same meeting was given 8 names of people already asked by Mr. Bostock to judge. A further 2 persons notified the Sub-Committee that they had been asked by Mr. Bostock, and were therefore enquiring what accommodation and transport arrangements had been

made for them.

At a get-together of the Sub-Committee Members at Eumundi on Wednesday, 22nd March, Mr. Bostock advised that 5 of the original 8 judges were no longer coming. At this time, he added Mr. Kelly Dixon to the list of his invited judges, and agreed that NO arrangements had been made for Judges' accommodation. HE ALSO RESIGNED, verbally, as of Thursday 23rd March, and insisted that he would not change his mind. His stated complaint was that we "had stabbed him in the back by agreeing to work with the Waltzing Matilda Centenary Committee and use their Marquee for the Championships."

organisation of the onerous task of completing the Championships therefore fell on the remaining members of the Sub-Committee, Ron Selby and myself. On contacting the six remaining judges, I found that only 2 intended being in Winton for the whole time. I then sought, and obtained the services of a variety of experienced, available-at-such-short-notice people to enable us to have the nominated decision of the Sub-Committee to have "three Adjudicators at all times" carried out.

Realising that we were liable for accommodation expenses of people officiating for us -- and that none of this had been considered because Mr. Bostock's stated plan was that we could all bunk down together in an A.B.P.A. Marquee - we naturally asked people we already knew were going to be there, or who lived nearby. We used 16 different

Judges over the period, and needed that number!

Some of the most talented, able people do not flaunt their skills, experience, and abilities. Their sphere of expertise is often purposely concealed from all but their very closest associates. A lot of delving was done, and phone calls made, in those final two weeks to boost our Adjudicator level! We ended up with a suitably-wide variety of applicable expertise.

It is history now that Mr. Bostock arrived in Winton declaring

that he hadn't resigned.

It will be a matter for the A.B.P.A. to formulate a policy regarding the eligibility of Organising Sub-Committee Members to compete in future Championships. Perhaps Mr. Bostock, Ron Selby, and I should not have competed! In future, perhaps, A.B.P.A could PAY an Organiser and his/her travelling and accommodation expenses. Such a

person would, then, not reasonably expect to compete!

I find the final paragraph mystifying. I know of no formal function or dinner that Mr. Bostock was or wasn't invited to! If the A.B.P.A. ran -- or was invited as an Organisation to -- any Dinner, it's news to me! N.O.P.A. ran a Dinner at LONGREACH to which EVERYONE was invited at a cost of \$20.00. Mr. Bostock was heard complaining that he hadn't been invited but this was AFTER the date on Regards.... Kelly Dixon's letter!

Dear Kelly,

In reference to your comments, I would like to point out that Judges approached by the Committee President, Mr. 'Bluey' Bostock, and as advised at the meeting in December 1994, were not all available to appear at Winton. I was not present at this meeting, but I believe some eight. (8) persons had been approached to adjudicate.

At a Sub-committee meeting in Eumundi (22.3.95) Mr. Bostock advised that five of the proposed judges would not be available.

Mr. Bostock then added your name to the list of proposed Judges: were you aware of this? If so, then you were empanelled by by a single member of the administrative staff, Mr. Bostock, who was also a Performer/Competitor. Mr. Bostock was of executive status at that time. Is this not so?

As for your experienced Judges. I found, in assisting Carmel Randle, who was co-opted by the executive when it was discovered that Mr. Bostock had not gained sufficient progress with the Events Corporation, that it was almost an impossibility to acheive Judges of the calibre required with such short notice, with no funds to pay them or their accommodation. Especially in Winton.

With regard to Judges Comments, I would venture to say that the criteria set out for the Judges to use was so designed that all Competitors were judged along the same guidelines, thus making the scoresheet, used properly, the Judges comments.

Condition 14 of the entry forms stated that 'The Judges decision on Heats and Finals are sacrosanct. No further discussion would be entered into.'

One or more of our Judges, however, saw fit to disclose his 'COMMENTS' to some of the Competitors.

My opinion of the Winton episode is, that Poets who appeared at the Breakfasts, and the Concerts in the Theatre Royal and in Clancys Marquee, were no doubt Performers. Poets who appeared at the Breakfasts, the Poets Brawl and the State of Origin in the Marquee were also Performers, and I agree that they should perform to entertain their paying audience.

However, Poets who entered in the Competitions were notably Competitors, whose main objective was to compete successfully against each other. They are not Professionals and are not all expected to have such a wide range of expertise.

Their contributions were equally entertaining, but as I point out they were Competitors and had the right to perform their best works for their own benefit. Letter (Cont'd)

Unfortunately, at Winton, some of our audience was made up of patrons who were in attendanc. For the full twelve days, some who were present for the tirst half, and then those who were present only for the second half.

Noticeably, many of the Judges were full time audience as well, bearing in mind, that without the ABPA, there was little else entertainment-wise in Winton, as many Poetry fao will testify

It is not uncommon in Competitons for Poets to recite the same Poem in the Heats as well as the Finals, making them both 'MECHANICAL and TECHNICAL,' in their strive for correctness. The audience would only be too aware of such practices.

Your balloting of multiple choices is worth noting for the future.

I cannot answer as to why Mr. Bostock was not invited to any formal function in Winton. Be advised that none of the ABPA members were invited to any formal function, Executive or otherwise.

Perhaps you could direct such question to the Queensland Events Corporation

I went to Winton to be a part of the Waltzing Matilda Centenary Celebrations, and this fact never once left my mind. I went there to Compete and to Entertain, and I did so to the best of my ability. I went to Winton to enjoy myself and I certainly did. It is a pity that some people lost all sense of purpose, but this happens.

Tiny took out the veteran ladies' freestyle in what she says was a surprise decision.

"I wasn't even worried about winning," she said. " As
