The 'Art World' has woken up to the entertainment value of 'Bush Poets' With requests coming from organisations who never before had poetry on their agenda.

Reporters have had a ball with the interviews and photo's in the media, Launching of books, sales of books and tapes. We have been expected and given the well deserved attention due to our art. Within two short years our membership covers ALL states of Australia, (also England and America!) and we are truly an Australian Association recognised throughout the 'Arts' world.

We can greatly expand on this, for within every family circle there is a poet wanting an opportunity to test their work.

Being nominated for Queenslander of the Year gave me great pride in our association for without Bush Poetry being a part of the Waltzing Matilda Celebrations, and the holding of the Australian Championship, I wouldn't of had the opportunity to travel throughout our fair land publicising the oncoming event. I share this honour with all! I have had preliminary discussions with marketing distributors for the sale of our books and tapes, regular poems and articles in magazines and news papers with australia wide distribution.

The Longyard 1995. The Longyard Hotel will again host the 'Best of the Bush' Breakfasts from Saturday 20th January at 8am.

Hosted by **Jim Haynes**, and Produced by **June Mary Smythe**, these concerts will feature some of Australia's leading Bush Poets as guests of the Longyard.

Breakfasts will be held on the first Saturday and Sunday mornings of the Country Music Festival, and again on the Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday mornings.

The Longyard will also stage a Bush Poetry State of Origin between Queensland and New South Wales. Queensland will be led by their Captain, Bobby Miller (the defector from the south) with Mark Gliori, John Major, Gary Fogarty and Shirley Friend (former English player).

The Mexicans will consist of John Philipson (Angry Anderson), Murray Hartin, Ray Essary and Gary Lowe led by Frank Daniel.

A **Poets Brawl** will be conducted for the first time at the Country Music Festival as well.

The State of Origin and the Brawl will be held on the Tuesday and the Wednesday mornings at 11am.

Longyard concerts will finish in time for patrons and poets to get to the Imperial Hotel Competition and to the new competition at the Oasis Hotel.

Following the success of last years inaugural effort, we advise visitors to Tamworth not to miss out on the fabulous 'Poets, Preachers and Liars' at the Heritage Theatre. starring Mark Gliori, Bobby Miller, Murray Hartin and Shirley Friend with accomplished Australian singersongwriter-poet Denis "Dingo" Dryden

*** BOOK REVIEW: 'THE BUILDER & OTHER RATBAGS' by Greg Young.

There is little doubt that 'Bush' poetry is gaining popularity at an almost exponential rate. This may seem just a trifle peculiar as no two people (bush poets included) are able to reach any sort of an agreement as to exactly what 'Bush Poetry' is.

There would, however, be a fair concensus that it is down to earth verse, generally rhymed, about largely everyday situations. Bush Poets, it has been said, can see humour (and thus a poem) in situations most wouldn't even think about.

One Sunshine Coast poet would appear to be riding the very crest of the wave. For Greg Young of Coolum, 1995 is his year of success.

Two of his poems were short- listed in this years national Henry Lawson Poetry Awards, and one, 'The Builder', was declared the winner. As if to highlight that his talents extend equally to both serious and comic verse, the other poem (on the January Bushfire of 94) then took out the Serious section at this years Mapleton Yarn Festival.

Greg is a long-standing member of the Mapleton Poets and his rather dry sense of humour has enlivened many a poet's breakfast at Mapleton and Maleny Festivals.

Being short-listed in the Lawson Awards at Gulgong wasn't exactly a new experience for Greg. Last year, his poem 'Grannie's Shopping List' also made the top ten where it was described by one of the judges, a professor Warwick Franks, as 'a rather cynical poem from Queensland about the judges of poetry competitions.... much in the vein of Charlee Marshall.' Ther've been 'Highly Commendeds' here and there but Greg is a bit reticent about listing them; instead his energy has gone to a long overdue project... publishing his first book of verse.

'The Builder & Other Ratbags' will undoubtably continue his winning run. In it Greg has a go at just about everyone in our society. "If you can't relate to the characters in this book," he says, You've never been outside your front door".

Many would feel hard-pressed to find the humour in a visit to the dentist... or even everyday greetings, yet Greg manages to. Political correctness exacts it's toll on Santa Claus. Unbelievable events befall a friend, hospitalised after miraculously surviving a fall from some scaffolding. Sirens, chauvinists, feminists, dud lovers.. the're all to be found in its pages. With excellent illistrations by Chase Young, it's a great book to read... and to read from.

Never one to lower his sights, Greg approached launching his book with characeristic enthusiasm & managed to entice Mr Tom Burns the Deputy Premier to do the deed at the launch on 16th Dec. at Buderim.

*** THE OLYMPIC DREAM. by Greg Young.


I'm awaiting the start

As ABPA does not yet have an Official Constitution, its Meetings have to be run under 'Standing Orders' -- that is, the standard Rules that ensure continuity of procedure during the Meetings of an assembly.

CONTRARY TO A STATEMENT IN LAST MONTH'S MAGAZINE, there is NO provision for postal votes, or postal nominations. (The Editor apologises for this error. No Postal Nominations were received.) The enclosed Proposed Constitution -- based on the 'Model' supplied by the Justice Department -- does not allow for them either. See "7. MANAGEMENT".

Under 'Standing Orders', Members cannot nominate themselves for positions! Should a Member wish to volunteer his/her services, he/she should arrange for someone else to nominate him/her, and another Member to 'second' the nomination. Should a Member wish to nominate another Member for a position, he/she should check in advance that that person is willing to accept nomination! A Member can only nominate or 'second' one person for one position, as this indicates who he wishes to vote for!

Nominations will be taken from financial Members present on the day and voted on by those financial Members present.

Our thoughts and prayers are with you, Bill, through this difficult time.



Bush projects win grants

BRISBANE: One of Australia's most famous bush poets would be honoured as part of a State Government tribute to the history of outback Queensland, Minister for Rural Communities Terry Mackenroth said yesterday.

The Henry Lawson House and Library would be one of four new rural tourism projects funded as part of a \$535,000 package for central western Oueensland.

He said \$45,000 would be allocated to Barcaldine Shire Council for establishment of the house at the Australian Heritage Workers Centre.

"The centre has been named in tribute to one of our most celebrated

bush bards and will house a unique collection of Australian short stories, poetry and other literary works," Mr Mackenroth said.

Other funding allocations included Blackall Shire Council, which would receive \$200,000 for restoration of the historical wool scour at Blackall, and \$150,000 would help complete the Qantas Founders Outback Museum at Longreach.

Winton Shire Council had been allocated \$150,000 to help build a cultural centre and museum to mark the birth place of Banjo Paterson's ballad, Waltzing Matilda.

Mr Mackenroth said the new projects would be funded under the Rural Living Infrastructure Program.



The signing comes just as Jim's latest release, "Don't Call Wagga Wagga Wagga" is taking off around Australia. Co-written and produced by Greg Champion the song is sung by Jim, Greg and Ted Egan, who are now calling themselves 'The Three Terrors'!

"Response to the song has been terrific," said Jim, "And the City of Wagga Wagga gave the three of us a Civic Reception." Massive Records have released the song on a four track CD with a song from each artist to complement the title track.



Profile..Bruce Simpson..

Bruce Simpson spent most of his life in the North West.

Starting a long apprenticeship as a very young man, Bruce worked in the Gulf Country, including Lorraine Station on the Leichardt River. Mainly working on the stockcamps and mustering, he learnt his trade well.

Bruce later went as a Drover in the Northern Territory working with the likes of 'Looking Glass' Joe Dowling, 'Spider' Hollands and Sam Fuller, before going out with his own plant.



His droving days saw him bring cattle in along the great Murranji Track. The Murranji was the main droving track from the East of the Kimberleys, stretching across the Northern Territory to Newcastle Waters and the Barkley Tablelands. From here the cattle were brought into Queeensland via Camooweal and driven to the fattening areas in the channel country along the Georgina River. Many were taken to the railhead at Dajarra, which, in the 1940's and 1950's was the biggest cattle trucking centre in the world.

For a number of years after his droving exploits, Bruce conducted a Saddlery business in the town of Winton.

In 1964 he married Heather, a lass from Edinburgh, Scotland. He and his wife have two children, Fiona and Ranald, and the family now lives at Caboolture in South-East Queensland.

The Territory Rouseabout is his first publication of his works and contains the humerous side of Bruce Simpson.

His verse has appeared in many magazines and newspapers, including the 'Sydney Bulletin', 'Hoofs and Horns', and the 'North Queensland Register'. Many have also been included in books of collected verse and other anthologies.

In 1972, Bruce won the Inaugural Bronze Swagman Award. a

world-wide competition for Bush Verse, conducted by the Winton Tourist Promotion Association

His winning poem was 'Gold Star' — a highly acclaimed poem by many poets and compared equally to A.B. (Banjo) Paterson's 'Man from Snowy River'

Bruce Simpson is the only poet to win the Bronze Swagman Award twice in its twenty three year history. His second win was in 1975 with 'Vale Rusty Regam'. In 1991 he came second with 'Fullers Thoroughbrace'.

Well known Tamworth Bush Poet and reciter, **John Philipson**, regards Bruce Simpson as the greatest living Australian Bush Poet, and rates 'Gold Star' the best poem by far.

John always chooses some of Bruce's work for inclusion in his performances, often including verses such as 'Murranji Mick', 'Gold Star', 'Vale Rusty Regan' and the 'Lament from the Scrub'.

At the next Maleny Folk Festival at Woodford (Q) over the New Year festive season, Bruce Simpson will be honoured by his peers. John Philipson has been asked by Bruce to be his mouthpiece and recite his works at this gathering.

Other Poets to have received this honour include Claude Morris, Keith Garvie and Charlee Marshall.

Ten year old **Paddy Ryan** of Duri, near Tamworth, had a win in the Junior section of the competitions when he recited 'Brumby George in the City', one of the most humerous poems from Bruce's book, at the Fireside Festival at the Longyard this year.
