President's Letter... Dear Members of the ABPA,

Just a few notes this month giving an indication of the progress being made by Bush Poetry in its great surge across Australia....

Media coverage of Australian Bush Poetry over the last few months has seen an influx of new Members, and enquiries about our Association.

John Farkas of Capital News in Tamworth has published in recent issues, articles about such Poets as John Philipson, Carmel Randle, and Gary Fogarty. Jon will have regular features in this primarily Country Music Newspaper.

The Australian Farmers' National Country Music Muster quarterly publication from Gympie, Queensland, also devotes a couple of pages -- and sometimes more -- to Bush Poetry, and specialises in Reviews of Poets' Books and Recordings. Another great poetry toe-hold in a C & W magazine!

National coverage was applauded when Nick Erby gave airplay to Gary Fogarty, Ray Essery, and yours truly on Hoedown, Sat. 22nd June. On Sat. 6th July, John Philipson, Gary Lowe, Shirley Friend and Bob Miller were featured.

On Sunday, 31st June, Nick Erby also featured Jim Haynes and myself on Country Music Jamboree. As a result, I have had many calls and letters from interested persons from far and wide, wanting to know more about Australian Bush Poetry ---- where they can hear more, how they can become a Member, and so on.

Nick informed me that more Bush Poetry will be aired from time to time, so I advise Members to make an attempt to catch his program, and write letters of appreciation, giving him some idea of just how many Poetry fans he has, and how far apart his listeners are.

Ian MacNamara of "Australia All Over" on ABC has also donated a lot of time to Bush Poetry, and has on more than one occasion featured readings from Bob Magor's books, as well as from the many listeners who send snippets to him.

More FM Stations throughout the country are playing tapes sent in by Bush Poets, and are always asking for more -- programs conducted by such as Dulcie Meddows in Sydney and Jan Lewis (Radio 3RUM) of Walwa in Victoria. Murray Hartin also has a Bush Poetry Show on Triple J in Sydney.

Marion FitzGerald of North Star NSW now has a segment on Radio 2VM Moree at 5.20 each Tuesday where she has a large enthusiastic audience of 'cotton pickin' cockies' ! (Who else would get up that early?)

Marion plays the best of the Bush Poets in her "Best of the Bush Bards" show, which is part of Ando's Country Music Program sponsored by Moree Alfarm Supplies.

'Blue the Shearer' of Wellington, NSW is now heard on ABC

Radio in Orange, Dubbo, Canberra, Wagga, and Bega on a weekly basis, and soon will go national on ABC from Melbourne.

Queensland ABC Radio also features a lot of Poetry on a regular basis, with Tim Butler in Longreach, Chris Jensen and Stuart Parry in Toowoomba, and David Anderson of Rockhampton being particularly active in this regard.

Bill Gleeson features Bush Poetry every morning on the ABC Breakfast session from Tamworth.

Bush Poets should take advantage of the free publicity given them in the wake of these Radio Programs, and should write letters of appreciation, and submit more of their work, to these Announcers.

They have seen the value of our work. Let us make value out of their use of our work! Let everyone know who you are and what you are!

BUSH POETRY AT THE GYMPIE MUSTER - HOW COME?

A few people have asked me that question lately. so to the best of my knowledge, this is how come.

Fifteen years ago the Webb Brothers, in conjunction with the Apex Club of Gympie, organised a week end of country music on their property near Gympie.

From that has grown The Gympie Muster which now runs for five days and attracts approximately sixty thousand people - many of whom camp, regardless of weather conditions. Is it conceivable that we could do this with bush poetry???

After three years at the Webb Brothers property, the Muster site moved to the Amamoor State Forest, where it has remained. It is organised and run by a very efficient, dedicated Committee, and all members can feel justly proud of their achievements.

Bush Poetry was introduced to Muster audiences only recently. In 1989 the organising Committee decided to include a Talent Search in their program and that incorporated a search for talented performers of Bush Poetry. The competitions were for the Original and Traditional "Kings of Rhyme".

An additional marquee, 'The Crowbar', was erected in 1992 and Mark Gliori was invited to perform there and introduce the Country Music Bands. Following that Muster, he was asked to submit recommendations regarding Bush Poetry for subsequent years. His suggestions for morning shows on Friday, Saturday and Sunday were adopted, and in 1993 the Breakfast Shows began, including competitions for the Original and Traditional 'Kings of Rhyme'. Mark compered the Shows and asked Jim Haynes, who was at the Muster performing musically, to do a Guest Spot. The Muster Committee was delighted and has welcomed Performance Poets in the Muster programme each year thereafter.

Heats for the Original and Traditional 'Kings of Rhyme' were given a separate time slot in 1995. The heats begin on Friday and Finalists perform and are judged at the Sunday morning show.

The morning shows had become so popular with campers that the Organisers asked Mark and Jim to begin the 1995 shows on Tuesday, and continue them daily for the five days of the Muster. This is also the schedule for 1996.

The considerable profits derived from each Gympie Muster are shared among nominated beneficiaries with an emphasis on Country orientated Charities.

AUSTRALIAN POETS and COPYRIGHT

Copyright requirements -- and the method of establishing them -- have changed significantly through the years. Currently, if you put the symbol "©" followed by your name, basic address, and the year on the bottom of a poem, you have established your ownership of that work.

If you allow another person, or group of persons, to publish one of your poems in an Anthology they are preparing, a Newspaper, or even an Advertising Brochure, you should sign a "Copyright Waiver" -- that is, a brief statement authorising them to so use your work. Many Entry Forms for "Write-In Competitions" now incorporate such a waiver. Before signing, it is wise to check that these are specific, eg. You give permission for that poem to be used for that particular Competition, or to be published or recorded in such merchandise as may be generated by that specific Competition. Look twice at Waivers that are not specific!

Anthologies resulting from such Competitions should have the © symbol and Poet's name with each Poem, and a general entry -- usually in the first couple of pages of the book -- stating that individual Authors retain the Copyright of their work.

When you publish your own Anthology, you can establish your Copyright of the work by requesting an ISBN Number, which is then printed on the cover (spine for preference) and again in the front of the book.

ISBN stands for the "International Standard Book Numbering" system. These numbers are available on request from the ISBN Agency in Canberra. Have ready

1. The Correct Title
2. The Author
3. The Publisher
4. The Publisher's Address.

If you are paying a Firm or Business to print the book for you, YOU are THE PUBLISHER -- as well as the Author.

You can get an ISBN number over the phone. There is no monetary cost. Phone (06) 262 1431 or FAX the above details to (06) 273 4492. Don't be in a hurry -- you may have to dial many times! Very late or very early seem to be the quickest times for contact!

To complete your registration of Copyright, you then MUST send a copy of the book (when it is printed) to the National Library, and the State Library in the Capital City of your State. Some State requirements also list one or two other Libraries to which you must supply a copy.

You should (eventually) receive a Receipt for these books. Check individual State requirements when you are requesting your ISBN.

HOW LONG DOES COPYRIGHT LAST?

Fifty years after the death of the owner of the Copyright!

I was recently handed a list of some Australian Poets whose works are now out of Copyright. This had been researched through "The Australian Companion to Literature" (Oxford Press) -- a book that is available in most Public -- and many Private -- Libraries. I include some of the List here for your reference...

There is much more information available from that same source, eg. some Poets very popular with Bush Poetry Performers are not yet out of Copyright. Using their work without permission for recordings, etc. could lead to problems!

POETRY IN MOTION.

On your marks. Get set. Muse. Sports - style poetry meets are thriving in Taiwan, the Sinorama news agency reports. The Keelung Poetry Research Society, which meets above a Bathroom Fittings shop in the northern Taiwanese city, is a typical example.

The contestants, mostly older men, wait breathlessly for the starter's gun, while the chairman of the Society scratches a suitable poetic subject on the blackboard at the front of the room. "Gathering Around the Stove" was a recent topic.

The signal to start is given, and the pens start scratching. In the old days, timing was done with a device incorporating an incense stick and a coin dangling by a thread over a bronze bowl. When the burning ember reaches the thread, the coin falls into the bowl with a resounding "clunk" and the poets stop writing and hand their masterpieces to the judges.

Today, Taiwan being what it is, they tend not to bother with the incense and coins, and just time the sessions with their Rolexes, although they still use the jargon by talking of "Hitting the Bowl Poetry Competitions."

Runner-up prizes are toothpaste and socks. The grand prize, for the poet who has shown masterful skill in celebrating the chosen topic with his choice of words, with flawless rhythm and cadence, is a packet of yummy monosodium glutamate. (Chewing Gum???)

Oh! What Shakespeare or Tagore would have produced with such incentives!

ALI THE LATEST IN A LONG LINE.

Mount Isa and Cloncurry poets picked up a swag of awards at the Greyhound Pioneer Cloncurry Bush Poetry Festival last month.

Four generations of one Mount Isa family competed in the event with all reaching the finals or winning their sections.

Nan Capewell and her daughters Merril Anderson, Dale Leard and Pat Fennell, granddaughter Kim McKelvie and her great-grand daughters Ali McKelvie and Nikki Anderson all reached the finals or won awards during the weekend.

Pat Fennell said the main thing at the Festival was the great diversity of ages with older people passing poetry onto young competitors.

"The atmosphere is always great at a Bush Poetry Festival because they don't compete madly and are happy when someone else wins," Mrs Fennell said.

"Having the family together was the highlight for us because my two sisters now live in Charleville so it was lovely for them to come back. It was beaut for my mother (Nan Capewell). It was terrific for her to have us all together happily competing in the Poetry Festival."

It was the first time Mrs Fenell, who won the Open Performance Modern Poetry, Best Poem on a theme of 'Women in Primary Industry' and Best Novice Award, had ever competed.

Nan Capewell, 82, won the Masters section and her grand - daughter Ali McKelvie, 6, won the Tender thirteen Performance.

Her sister Merryl Anderson won best poem on a Wildlife theme and her other sister, Dale Leard, won the Best Traditional Humorous Poem section.
