Presidents Letter

Dear members of the ABPA.

Here we are well into another new year of Bush Poetry — but how far have we progressed? How far will we go as an Association? I am beginning to wonder!

After the general meeting in Tamworth last month, I can honestly say that I was absolutely disgusted with the lack of physical and vocal support by many members present in Tamworth; some who didn't even bother to turn up for the meeting or tender an apology. Sure it was not the AGM that we would have preferred, but it was to me, and the ABPA, an important meeting.

Much criticism from Association members comes to hand only too often — mostly from the 'noise-makers' who always ask 'Why don't we?' These same people are never around when we ask 'Will you?'

During the past two months many people have contacted me expressing their deep concern over our own well-being as a united group of Bush Poets.

Concern is raised at the amount of pettiness, the conflicting of ideas, the bickering and the politicalness which is stuffing up a good idea.

When the ABPA Inc. was formed in 1994, the Inaugural President came up with a some visions splendid and some far reaching plans, far and beyond his own capabilities, but over-all, a terrific idea to bring the Bush Poets of Australia together in one big happy family - keeping them informed, encouraging them and others to keep the Australian in Austalia aware of his own history through verse and prose.

I am not happy that so many have made the ABPA the meat in the sandwich when they have complaints. Our current Secretary tells us how we have so many letters of praise and admiration for our work - but he always manages to to print letters or excerpts which create embarrassment to others from those who are not overly happy with certain aspects concerning festivals and poets. Most of these writers I find have in reality been poorly informed and in some instances emotionally stirred by others to write.

I feel that if we are to succeed, to keep our membership numbers healthy and attract new members, we must produce more equibly, a news-letter which will promote ourselves, our members, the various organisers of festivals and competitions, and, most of all, Bush Poetry — keeping our culture alive, hanging on to our Heritage.

As an incorporated body, there are a lot of rules that so many expect us to abide by, but as far as I am concerned there are no rules to enjoyment and good clean healthy fun. All this comes from good fellowship which I have

always tried to promote, and I believe that I have done this to the best of my ability - but sadly, there is always someone who is not happy.

Letters of complaint regarding festivals and competitions and poets should not be made the subject of this newsletter. Too much is wasted in this regard. Too many readers are subjected to a lot of unwanted, un-necessary garbage in this respect.

Such letters I would welcome - but I would deal with them directly or pass them on to the person or persons concerned and not make an issue of them.

As an example, one of last years major concerns was over the performance of a non-member poet, of whom few of us had ever heard. We haven't seen nor heard of him since. It is plain to me that we won't hear from his like too often, and, if and when we do, we will not acknowledge them if their work is not up to scratch.

Those poets and organising committees that are genuinely trying to do the right thing are going ahead in leaps and bounds. Their success is measured by the increasing number of venues and functions at which they are performing — and by the ever increasing size of their audiences.

Those who have it will succeed. Those who need it will certainly have my whole-hearted support, and I wish them well in the coming year.

I am sad to say that the past year has been a bit of a shambles in more ways than one, with many internal head-aches in the Association having been cleared up. I hope that 1997 will be a year to boost our comradery and our well-being by sticking together and having fun. We are off to a clean start, the 1997 Bush Poetry calendar is a full one with lots more to come.

Regrettably I wish to inform members that this will be my last contribution to the Newsletter as President of the Australian Bush Poet's Association Inc. Due to heavy work commitments this year, I will not have the available time to do the job to the best of my ability.

I hope that at the Annual General Meeting on the 22nd March members will put a lot of thought into who the new committee will be, and that they will give the necessary support to those elected.

As was stated in the December issue, the Net will give Bush Poets, in time, a much wider and sought after audience - with opportunities for Poets to advertise their products — books, cassettes and CD's.

Committees organising festivals and so on are welcome to make use of this facility. I will give it a run for a year or so, with regular updates and Poet's Calendars, and see what comes out of it for those that are interested in it's use. Frank.

Three hundred and fifty enthusiasts turned up to Wireless Hill Park to witness and hear their Challenge Finals. 'Praise for the event was almost embarrassing' said Rusty. The name 'Challenge' has been adopted as they now consider that the winners of the overall event can now challenge the best in the country.

Well established Bush Poet and Yarner, Keith Leithbridge won the Poetry section, after winning the inaugural contest last year, a measure of his ability.

Keith's prize is a trip to Winton in Queensland for the Quantas Waltzing Matilda Bush Poetry Championships. Rusty assures us that he will be a worthy contender.

Jeff Swain won the Yarn-spinning which surprised many as he was tipped to take out the reciters section. Jeff will be off to Adelaide in early March for the Second Funny Business - Advertiser International Yarn Spinning Challenge against a host of invited guests including last years winner Kel Watkins of WA.

The standard of this years competition was so far greater than last years that it was almost impossible to separate the finalists, of ten poets and seven yarners.

Excellent media coverage gave the contest the impetus it needed and total support from the Local Authority saw the Deputy Mayor opening the proceedings.

Follow up news items have heralded a 'tiger on the loose in the west', and Rusty and his mates have him by the tail.

GOLEN GUMLEAF BUSH LAUREATE AWARDS.

The second Annual Bush Laureate Awards were handed out at the famous Longyard Hotel in Tamworth on Tuesday 21st of January during the 1997 Country Music Festival.

The awards recognise the growing importance of Bush Poetry in Australia. First presented in 1996, these awards have quickly become one of the premier goals for poets from around Australia. The Awards are presented in three sections. 1. The Book of the Year. 2. The Album of the year. 3. The Heritage Award.

For the second time in the two years, Bob Miller of Mungar Q. took out the Album of the Year with "The Larrikin Live" (Koala River Studio. Producer Chris Foley).

The Award for Book of the Year went to Carmel Randle of Preston Qld. for "Gone Bush". (Published by Carmel Randle).

The Heritage Award was won by Bruce Simpson of Caboolture Q. for "Packhorse Drover" (Published by ABC Books).

The presentations were hosted by radio personality, Nick Erby, and drew a large audience who enjoyed performances by Carmel Dunn, Jim Haynes, Bob Miller and Frank Daniel. Special guests were Ted Egan, Troy Cassar-Daly, Shanley Del, Felicity and Beccy Cole.

Spokesperson for the Judging Panel, Mr. Colin Munro said he was impressed by the scope and sensitivity of the entries, with the excellent standard making the judging very difficult.

A new trophy was introduced this year, designed by leading Goldsmith and designer, Ernst Pfenninger of Sydney.

The Bush Laureate Awards are sponsored by the Tenterfield Saddler.

BLACKENED BILLY AWARDS.

The seventh annual Blackened Billy Awards for Bush Verse were announced in Tamworth at a ceremony at the Imperial Hotel on Saturday, 25th of January.

Winner of the Golden Gumleaf Award for Book of the Year, Carmel Randle of Preston Q. was outright winner of the 1997 Blackened Billy for her Poem, "Just an Isolated Case".

The Blackened Billy Trophy is designed and crafted by Fred Hillier.

BLUE BOSTOCK BUSH POETRY COMPETITION OASIS HOTEL ---- TAMWORTH.

Tamworth Country Music Festival, 23, 24, 25 JAN.

Following the previous year where Boulia Bates who for the assistance of all poets who came to Tamworth wishing to try out their poems, and get experience from mixing with poets from all over parts of Australia, started a new venue at the Oasis Hotel and asked me if I would be his assistant. We held a successful competition and were well supported by poets. Sadly Boulia's wife, Gloria, passed away late last year and the task of continuing this very important venue was left for me to continue.

I set about organising with the Oasis publican, times for poetry in between his guest artists and bands. we played it by ear for the first four days and for some 30 poets there was a chance to perform without the pressure

of competition.

The promise of support from a sponsor after last years festival left the expenses begging for support and too late for anyone to capitalise on poetry popularity. I bore the cost of printing 200 road signs, painting banners and judging sheets, as I felt the importance of having an open forum for all poets who travelled to Tamworth, tantamount as all the other venues are closed shop.

At first the absence of most of the recognised poets for support, was a dissappointment to me, however, be assured they weren't missed, for the standard of poets was as good as could be found anywhere. The few old friends who supported our venue get my gratitude. They haven't forgotten when we could hold our poetry in a phone box

and have seats to spare, only a few short years ago.

The Oasis Beer Garden is the best setting you could find, it is a natural amphitheatre of grassy slopes, shade

trees and adequit seating for thousands.

Next year I will have extended time for my show, giving more poets a forum to air their talents. With the assistance of sponsors advertising, this rural setting will be the spot to take in Australian Bush Poetry in comfort.

The popularity of our three day contest gave the organisers a trying time making sure everyone got a go,

excess of forty poets in each category and finals.

In this rural setting our judges, Robbie Gough of Charters Towers, Bruce Simpson of Caboolture and Kelly Dixon from Camooweal could hane been excused for thinking any minute 'Saltbush Bill' or 'The Man from Snowy River' might flash past the performers stage. Such was the standard of the Traditional Verse. While the Original section had the crowd holding their sides with laughter. I wish they all could have been winners.

Ron Selby, the backbone of our Association, came to my rescue by making exotic wood trophies. I cannot thank

him enough for his invaluable assistance.

Michael Darby's free passes on Greyhound Coaches to The Cloncurry Festival were welcome awards for all the winners.

I have ski-ed the snows of Winter, Scaled the heights where rivers rise, On the rooftop of Australia, 'Neath those wide Monaro skies.


I have fished those sylvan waters Where the pools run deep and dark, On the Bidgee, below Tantangara, In the Kosciusko Park.
