"Bush Poetry - Time Capsules From The Past"

Our convict ancestors were the scum of the earth. Thieves, murderers, prostitutes, forgers, you name it we had them. Of course, some were victims of the times and political prisoners, but so few of them were as innocent as many would have us believe. Yet, in spite of all the odds, and, such an unwholesome foundation, they built our nation. Without question, for me, in spite of her faults, and she has 'em, Australia is the finest country on the planet. That something this wonderful can come from such unfavorable circumstances is nothing short of a miracle.

How many times does one hear the like of: "Australia has no heritage!" "We have no culture!" For those who believe that, may I suggest you open both eyes. We have built more traditions in a little over two hundred years than many countries have in two thousand. And it's all been recorded; not just by official archives, but by those who did it. They wrote songs and poetry about their daily lives, their troubles, their triumphs, their good times and their bad. Read them and you discover who our ancestors were and who we are.

Right from the days of the First Fleet, convicts and free settlers alike have been putting their thoughts in verse. Much of it is lost, but not all, Some of it we don't know the author. Jokingly, some of us refer to such works as written by that great Greek/Australian poet - Anonymous.

For some, poetry will always be regarded as an intellectual exercise. Perhaps in some ways it is. But, it was born from the pure necessity by those who could not read or write. In fact, even today there are still a few illiterate poets. But to return to the point. Illiterate people needing to send messages by illiterate carriers to illiterate receivers found putting messages in simple verse usually guaranteed that the message arrived intact. From humble beginnings, it was soon learned story telling could be enhanced by verse and it soon became a popular means of entertainment, in lieu of TV. This was a good thing as TV had not yet been invented.

Luckily there is no need for outstanding academic genius to composed verse, as our ancestors were certainly not literary giants but they gave us a precious gift of poetry that has always been part of our way of life. While we don't know the authors of many early poems we do know a few. For instance, Frank the poet (a.k.a. Frank MacNamara) a convict who spent time in Moreton Bay. One of Frank's poems is still popular today with singers of traditional Australian music. It's known by a variety of names, *Moreton Bay* being one. It tells of misfortunes there and under the alleged tyranny of the much hated Commandant, Captain Logan.



In time, free men started to make their mark on Australian Poetry. Adam Lindsay Gordon is regarded by many as our first Poet. He was a well bred Englishman strongly influenced by the works of Shelly, Byron, Tennyson and, probably most of all, Browning. His "Bush Ballads & Galloping Rhymes" set the direction bush poetry still follows today. Close on his heels came Australian born, Henry Kendall. His "Bell Birds" still stirs the imagination.

Soon after Gordon and Kendall came the two greats of Australian poetry. Strange as it seems to us with wisdom of hindsight, in the beginning both were unsure of their worth. Both were intimidated by the works of Gordon and Kendall. One of the "new" poets initially wrote under the name of a horse from his childhood - Banjo. This is how Andrew Barton Paterson became nicknamed "Banjo". Henry Lawson, son of a Norwegian, is the other great who in spite of a tragic personal life recorded what he saw and became known and loved as the "peoples poet".

From this firm foundation many poets, some great, some unknown, have been recording our way of life since 1788. Everything about us is recorded from our seafarers to our cameleers, from drovers to helicopter pilots, it's all there, our past our present. Each poem tells a little about who we were at the time of writing and as such, it is in itself a tiny time capsule for our future - our kids. Hopefully through a knowledge of their past, they will know where they come from. Surely this is the first ingredient in knowing where they are going? Can we give them a greater gift than that.

JOHN O'BRIEN FESTIVAL

The Annual John O'Brien Festival at Narrandera (NSW) held from 15th, to 18th, March was hailed as the most successful yet.

In conjunction with St. Patricks day, this very Irish Australian festival covers all manner of entertainment from beer brewing competitions, singalongs, church services, art exhibitions, crafts and food stalls to Bush Poetry.

Narrandera and the Parish of St. Mels was the home of the great Father Patrick Joseph Hartigan (1878 – 1952) who

wrote under the pseudonym of 'John O'Brien'.



Patrick Hartigan was born near Yass (NSW) in October 1878 to Irish parents. He attended school in Yass, later studying for the priesthood at St. Patricks College, Manly.

Of interest to readers might be the fact that Father Hartigan was one of the first priests with a motor car, and that in 1911, he took the last sacraments to Jack Riley - said to have been 'Banjo' Paterson's 'Man from Snowy River'.

In 1917, Father Hartigan assumed the role of Parish Priest of Narrandera. A keen student of Australian literature, he first published verse in the local press, the Catholic Weekly, and the Bulletin under the pen-name of 'Mary-Ann'. Later encouragement from C.J. Dennis and others saw him publish 'Around the Boree

Log' and other verses under the name of 'John O'Brien' in November 1921.

These days the memory of 'John O'Brien' lives on, not only in Narrandera, but in the guise of Brisbane performance poet, Noel Stallard. Noel's portrayal of the old master is none short of excellent with appreciative audiences attending his performances throughout the festival.

Visitors to Narrandera are never short of something to do, with Irish music and singalongs, bush dancing, street performers, displays and exhibitions.

Bush Poetry comes to the fore of course in the hands of Geoffrey Grahame, Noel Stallard, Frank Daniel and Noel Cutler. Geoffrey's Federations show "100 Not Out" and the Bush Poets Breakfasts were all sell-outs, with a number of quality performances by guest artists such as Jim Angel, Ken Dean, Don Anderson, Brian Beazley and Sandra Conway.

Congratulations to Julie Briggs and the Narrandera committee for their efforts in promoting Australian Bush Poetry and furthering the cause of so many aspiring new poets.
