When *Waltzing Matilda* was written on Dagworth Station and at the North Gregory Hotel, the Winton District was in the grip of a depression which, after some abatement, intensified into the true Depression of the late twenties and thirties. All of Australia collectively drew on all available resources, both personal and national, to weather out the protracted crisis.

Since that time, Winton has remained a rather sleepy town in the middle of Queensland's outback, somewhere between Longreach and Mt Isa. Then, five years ago, the city-fathers became conscious of the pending centennial of the writing of Australia's most famous national song and decided that a celebration was called for that would put Winton on the map forever more. Dreams have escalated into plans and imaginations have been captured starting with the local citizenry, followed by the State as well as national organisations and companies.

More than a million dollars has been pumped into the preparations and all of Winton has been undergoing a transformation. John Watson from the Queensland Events Corporation has been in charge of "themeing" the town and, although he says he can't reveal too much just yet, the fact that Winton is

slowly starting to take on the look of a giant movie set is unmistakable.

Winton is on the brink of the biggest celebration the Australian outback has seen and it shows.

Mayor Eric Lenton says the district is anticipating an infusion of many millions of dollars. "The Shire is currently building a

Waltzing Matilda Cultural Centre which will further bring home the point to all visitors that Winton is the birthplace of Australia's most significant and best-loved national song. After this bash, no-one will ever forget it. The historic celebrations of this year will set Winton on a new economic path, that of tourism."

Tamworth Country Music Festival saw our own Gina Jeffreys winning Female Vocalist of the Year and another Queenslander, Mackay singer and songwriter Graeme Connors won Song of the Year.

Meanwhile Queensland bush poets were well represented among the prize winners at the festival.

From 125 entries submitted from all over Australia in The Blackened Billy Bush Poetry Writing competition, Queenslanders took out second and third prizes.

Five of the seven highly commended poems were Queensland entries.

Toowoomba's Carmel Randle was third and Thangool's Charlee Marshall was second with Ron Stevens, of Dubbo, first.

Among the highly commended were Toowoomba's Ron Selby and Bill Glasson, of Clifton.

Bush poets announce coming party

From January until April, more than fifty townships will be treated to the colourful spectacle of a large troupe of bush poets dressed in period costume entering the towns to be received by the local mayor. Cabaret performances will follow as well as visits to local schools.

The Bush Poets Walk is part of an ardent plan. As Bluey Bostock, Promotions Officer for the Waltzing Matilda Centenary Celebrations explains, "We want to ensure that the tradition of Australian bush poetry is kept alive and is spread to everyone as part of our living heritage. We also want to collect for the Queensland Drought Appeal and for the Flying Doctor as we publicise the Waltzing Matilda Centenary Festival at Winton so that as many people as possible will be able to come. We are busy but we're loving every minute of it."

As the poets travel through the townships, schoolchildren will be encouraged to write poems and enter them in competitions to win prizes with a Waltzing Matilda theme.

The irrepressible Blue Bostock is not new to outback Australians. Apart from being Publicity Officer for the Centenary, Bluey is also President of the Australian Bush Poets Association, making him head bush poet for the pending Bush Poets Walk.

The bush poets will receive a heroes' welcome in Winton as one of the highlights of the Waltzing Matilda celebrations. At the Festival the poets will inaugurate the R. M. Williams Australian Bush Poetry Championship in honour of the man who is widely regarded as the modern grandfather of Australian bush poetry.

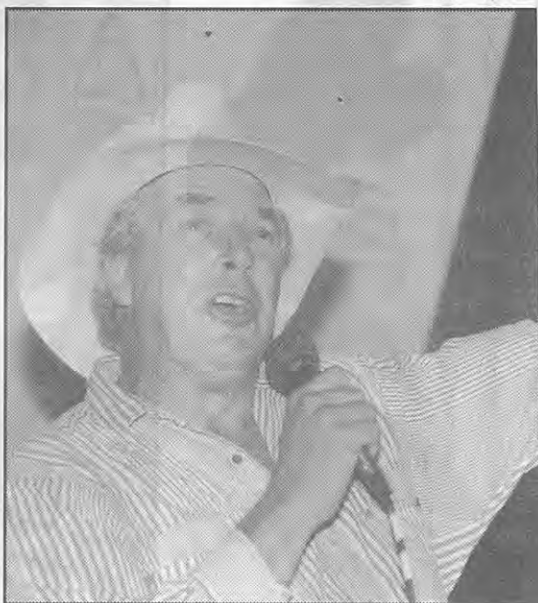

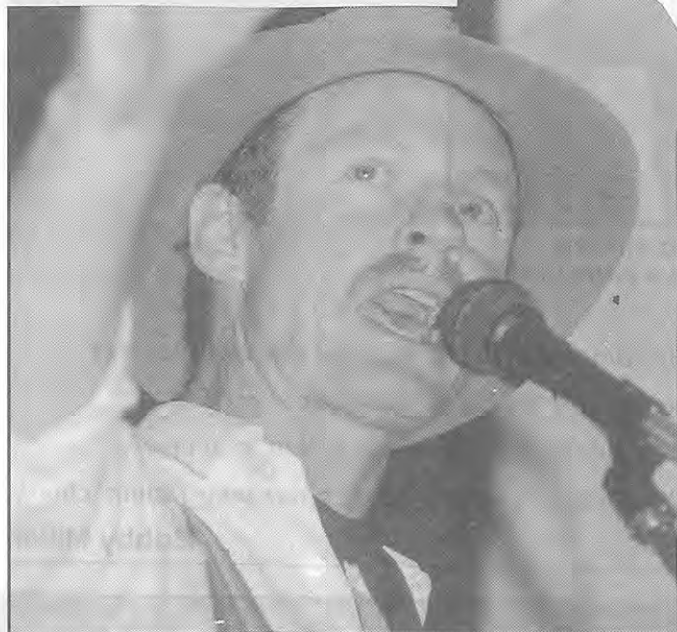

This was originally put down for Stephen Keir from Akubra Hats in Kempsey N.S.W. It's my way of giving recognition to the best hat ever made.

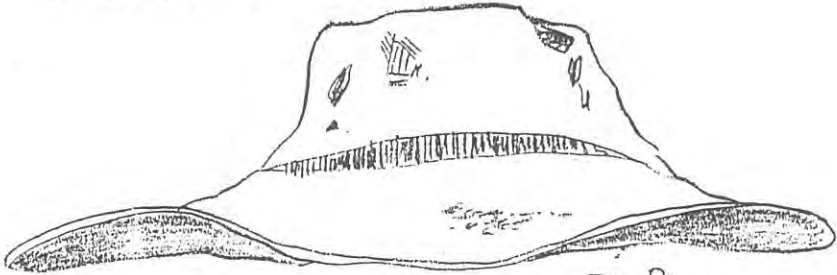
I'm the Cocky's badge of office, I'm part of many ringers lives

I'm that symbol of the Aussie bush, the old Akubra hat.



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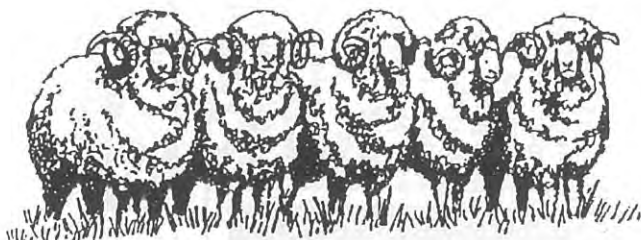
