

Our thanks are extended to retiring President, Frank Daniel and congratulations for a job well done, both as President and Editor. To Bluey, who is having a rest from the executive for the first time too, we thank you for all you did in our formative years. A new editor has taken over the ropes from Frank - Maureen Garner from Nambucca Heads. Please give her your full support. The magazine can only be as good as the information you send in, so items or poems should be posted to her, and all money and other business sent to me. Of course, if you have some small thing for the news, you can include it in my mail if your are writing to me. We don't want members to incur unnecessary expenses.

It was decided at the AGM, that newsletter advertisements for personal product would cost \$5.00 or a little more depending on size, however clubs or committees etc who run poetry functions will still be advertised free.

The ABPA Annual Books of Verse are causing concern, as we have excessive stocks on hand. Perhaps it has not been properly explained that members may buy Annuals for \$3.00 and resell for \$5.00. I hope some of our poets with books and cassettes will keep them on their sales tables and in that way we may clear the backlog. If this does not happen, the future of our Annual is in jeopardy. Also, recapping for new members that we have four Annuals available, although one is getting scarce. Postage is \$1.10 for 2 books. If you buy 12 or more, post is free!

I draw your attention to the "Code of Ethics" in Sept. newsletter (copies are available to new members). We want comments on it, and also, two other learned opinions are being sought (see P 5). We need to adopt a Code of Ethics and what it should be.

Eventually, I settled down after arriving home from Tamworth. What a great time it was. Our poets did us proud and we enjoyed all we heard. Congratulations must go to them for their dedication, and their wonderful talents. Some were concerned about crudity creeping into some venues, but we were not aware of this at the shows which we attended.

POETS LANE

The City of Queanbeyan has a new lane following the official opening of "Poets Lane" by Mayor Frank Pangallo in late November.

The Queanbeyan Bush Poets meet monthly at "The Rhubarb and Muscat Coffee and Eating House" which is situated in a (formerly) unnamed lane running off the main street.

Following difficulties in describing to visitors how to find the cafe, it was suggested that if the lane were called "Poets Lane", life would be a lot easier. David Meyers and Laurie McDonald then prepared a "rhyming submission" to the Queanbeyan City Council and following an invitation by the Mayor, they presented the poem (sorry, submission) to the Council Meeting of 21st August 1996. The reception from Council was terrific, one council member even writing and presenting a poem of support.

Another 15 months passed before all approvals were in place, and with the erection of the sign complete, the lane was declared open by Mayor Frank Pangallo at an entertaining ceremony on 28th November 1997.

Following is an excerpt from a very long poem sent by the Queanbeyan Poets to the local Mayor requesting the naming of Poets Lane.

CODE OF ETHICS

At the Annual General Meeting of the Australian Bush Poets Association held on Saturday, 24th January, 1998 in Tamworth, a motion was put forward to accept the 'Keith McKenry' "Draft Code of Ethics" as published in the September '97 issue of our newsletter (Find it now and read it.)

Marco Gliori made representation that we should explore the matter further, and has undertaken to write to both Bill Scott and Jim Haynes, both scholars/folklorists/performers in their own right. Marco has asked for a reply or comment based on three questions.

- 1. Do we need a code of ethics/what purpose would it serve to members or prospective members.
- What would constitute, in your opinion, a fair and equitable code of ethics. (Your own draft Code of Ethics)
- Any comments/discussion you wish to make on the Code of Ethics proposed by Keith McKenry.

There is of course no obligation on either Bill or Jim to undertake this discussion, but any imput they give will be appreciated.

An invitation is also extended via this letter to any other member who wishes to make comment or discussion on this matter.

We look forward to as much imput from members as possible.

Situated on the outskirts of the historic Bungendore Village, Elmslea, with it's park-like grounds and towering pines and elms, is a magical setting for early morning risers and poets alike, as they gathered in the cool dewy mornings of late January for a cooked breakfast and two and a half hours of non-stop entertainment. Breakfast was cooked by the members of the Queanbeyan Poets Association.

Guest performers this year were Milton Taylor of Portland NSW and "Blue the Shearer" of Wellington NSW. "Blue" and Milton conducted a performance workshop for local primary school students on the Friday afternoon, instilling a lot of enthusiasm into the children. They found three willing new writers in nine year old Sarah Davis and ten year olds, Anita Bruce and Georgia Milne. The girls were further encouraged by the audiences on the following two mornings.

Master of Ceremonies and Compare for the week-end was former 'local boy' Frank Daniel, who kept the ball rolling at a good pace ensuring never a dull moment. Among the twenty eight poets performing daily were well known performers such as Graeme Johnson of West Ryde, David Meyers of Queanbeyan, Laurie MacDonald of Canberra, Jean Tibay of Goulburn, Warren 'Arch' Bishop of Whalan, Terry Regan of Blaxland, Barry Martin of Bungendore and John Ley of Valley Heights.

Highlight of the week-end was the gathering of twenty poets, wives and friends around the huge dining room table for grand evening meal on the Saturday Night. All were guests of Miles and Toni Flanagan, proprietors of Elmslea, and with 'home' only a walk down one of the long hallways, a fairly late hour was seen before the washing up was cast aside for the morning. GOLDEN GUMLEAF BUSH LAUREATE AWARDS

Australian history and heritage were celebrated in sweltering style during the star-studded 3rd Annual Golden Gumleaf Bush Laureate Awards on Tuesday, 20th January. It was a celebration which embraced bush poetry and country music.

A very patient crowd of over 1000 crowded into the Country Club Pavilion at West Tamworth Leagues Club to enjoy performances from Bush Laureate finalists and country music stars.

Slim Dusty, John Williamson, Graeme Conners, Troy Cassar-Daley, Shanley Del, Darren Coggan, Jane Saunders, Frank Daniel, Jim Haynes, Bob Magor, Ray Essery and the Bush Kids presented a brilliant afternoon of laughter and entertainment.

Nick Erby compared and Tamworth Mayor, James Trelore, who presented an award spoke with enthusiasm about the intrinsic links between bush verse and country music. He expressed pleasure that the Golden Gumleaf Awards were held in Tamworth and said "Since its humble beginnings in 1996, it was now in danger of becoming one of the most prestigious events of the Festival".

Event organiser, Mrs. Judith Hosier and sponsor, Brian Meldon (The Tenterfield Saddler) were delighted with the public response. Attendance was more than double that in 1997.

The Big Bush Brecky Show featured a specially created stage set with the "Outdoor Dunny" as stage door, through which came a myriad of top line poets and entertainers to delight record crowds on every performance day.






