But the bliss upon their faces showed it hadn't died in vain,
And they thanked me for my silence, said they knew I wouldn't talk,
Then they told me I was "bonzer", and they offered me some pork.

In spite of the aroma, I declined, and then I left,
Though first I gave a sermon on the deadly sin of theft,
But for all the good it did, I might as well had held my tongue,
The boys took no more notice than I did when I was young.

And afterwards the bridegroom turned to me and gave a smile,
"I must admit that Fossey's done this while affair with style,
But the meal was not as tasty - though I'd never tell him so -
As that feed of pork and watermelon all those years ago!"

BUSH POETRY IN THE 'TOWERS', Qld.

A very enthusiastic group took advantage of the Workshop held by Helen Avery and Milton Taylor. We hope the knowledge gained will see some worthwhile efforts surface next year.

The RSL Club proved a suitable venue for the performance competition supported by a larger audience than envisaged who were treated to some outstanding efforts, winning entrants duly rewarded with appropriate trophies and cash prizes.

Although the 'overflow' expected from the Winton Championships did not eventuate - maybe with earlier 'NEWS' next time may be more rewarding. Milton Taylor from Portland, NSW and Helen Avery of Longreach were engaged for the 3 day program - and their particular skills in performance impressed all who took in the various sessions, particularly the schools who were afforded visits during their busy schedule in the Towers.

They were able to 'meet' by radio with a class at the school of Distance education, with some of the students offering a 'sample' of their own writings in response.

Millchester State School and Columba Catholic college students, totalling more than 150, were also privileged to enjoy a variety of Australian Bush Poetry performances with 'gusto' - a style that puts life into a performance. Next year, hopefully more schools will be able to be involved in view of enhancing the popularity of Bush Poetry.

All up - everyone who participated in one way or another, including the two Bush Poets Breakfasts, voted the Festival of Australian Bush Poetry a huge success, and will eagerly await for next year to be bigger and better.

Therefore, while the Gold City Country Music Club hosted the 1999 program, they are hoping a separate Gold City Bush Poets group will undertake more responsibility and make it all happen again! Competition Results are on page 6.

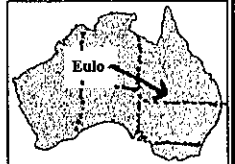
