

In the 1960s, Keith's inability to sing in tune led to his reciting bush verse around rock-climbing campfires, and as no-one could understand the intended tunes of his occasional original songs he took to reciting these as well. He hit the small time in 1980, when he presented a workshop at the 14th National Folk Festival in Alice Springs. Since that time he has performed frequently in concerts, festivals and folk clubs around Australia.

He is the only person to have recited

'McArthur's Fart' at a reception on the 30th floor of the United Nations Building in New York, 'The Spirit of the People' in the foyer of the Australian High Court, or 'A Study in Linguistics' in the Concert Hall of the Sydney Opera House. In 1983 he hosted the Inaugural Poets' Dinner at the National Folk Festival, thereby establishing on festival programs an on-going toehold for reciters and poets. Canberra - we only elect four federal Over the years, with the emergence of new generations of reciters and bush poets, that toehold has grown exponentially. Singers, musicians and dancers have never forgiven him.

Keith has an unhealthy fascination with old, obscure Australian poetry books and periodicals, from which he has distilled material for his many festival workshops. These presentations have addressed such issues as racism in Australian folklore, the nature and origins of obscenity, and the democratic

tradition in Australian verse.

In 1985 "Disgusted of Horsham" called for his permanent black banning from folk festivals, on account of the supposed unsuitability of his material for young children and grannies. No young children or grannies complained, however and so, sadly, the opportunity was not taken up.

In 1987, in Paris, Keith was elected Chairman of UNESCO's Committee of Technical and Legal Experts on the Safeguarding of Folklore. He also served as a member of the Commonwealth Committee of Inquiry into Folklife in Australia, and was co-author of its Report, Folklife. Our Living Heritage. president of the organising committee of Australia's National Folk Festival.

Keith has published a number of books of verse, and with his friend the late Alan Scott (a wonderful bush singer) released two fine albums of Australian bush song and poetry performed in the traditional style. Keith's first solo album, Bugger the Music, Give Us a Poem! won the 1999 Golden Gumleaf Bush Laureate Award for Album of the Year. It is available both on Fanged Wombat CD and on ABC Audio cassette.

REVIEW - Keith McKenry (with Alan Scott) Travelling Through The Storm (CD)

"Travelling through The Storm" is a collection of Australian Bush Songs and Poems by two exceptional artists. Alan Scott provides the musical and singing prowess, and Bush Poet, Keith McKenry, recites. It is the second album in the "Battler" series, recorded by the National Library of Australia.

One of the factors that makes this album stand out from the growing numbers of Bush Poetry recordings is its historical aspect. In just over one hour of listening, you can hear classic English ballads, poetry from the 1880's and 1890's, old-time dance tunes inherited from Irish and Scottish forebears, folk songs and bush tunes from the depression years, songs of Union men, and contemporary poetry. It is a wonderful blend of history, folk lore, and verse. Alan Scott's music is simple, yet genuine, and the lyrics

However, this recording also owes some of its attraction to the quality of Keith McKenry's vocal tone and ability. This well-selected mix of original and traditional verse is recited proficiently and effectively. Keith's mellow voice and expressive interpretations are a pleasure to listen to, and add a unique quality to this performance.

Both performers have managed to capture a distinctly "Australian" feel, with all the idiosyncrasies and idioms of our language coming across easily, yet not taking centre stage.

This CD preserves an important part of our heritage, and does it very well. I regarded reviewing it as a privilege.

REVIEW - Keith McKenry McKenry's Curse and Other Verse (Book)

Many facets of Keith McKenry are reflected in his book, "McKenry's Curse and Other Verse". There are wry observations on folk festivals, comments on world politics (after all, he lives in Canberra!), and heritage pieces. Some are in the traditional rhyming Bush Poetry format, others are more abstract word structures, and a couple are of visual interest only. Many times, he is recording current events with an awareness of their future historical importance.

Keith has a strong grasp of language, enabling him to use and manipulate words well. The subjects covered in his poetry range from the profound to the comical. But Keith's poetry is never a light read, as most of his verse is thought-provoking. This is not a book to skim through, but a volume to be read at leisure in pensive moments.

Another modern Bush Poetry trend that needs attention is the practice of converting jokes to poems and calling them Bush Poems. For example, some drunk falling into a grave and shortly afterwards another drunk falls in to join him, could hardly be called a Bush Poem in the traditional sense. Yet I have seen poets win competitions using that poem. Now, depending on the theme, some jokes may convert to a believable Bush Poem.

Perhaps there should be a separate event for jokes turned into poems. True Bush Poems should be about real people, places and events.

Also, how about a Gospel section for Bush Poets! What's sauce for the Country Singers, should be sauce for Bush Poets.

A Note to Organisers of Written Competitions

Editorial Comment

Over the few months that I have been Editor, I have received many comments regarding the organisation of competitions. I also spend much time sifting through information regarding competitions. While most competition organisers are doing a wonderful job - many spending hours of their own time on a thankless task - there is obviously the occasional problem cropping up. These range from minor to a few that could only be termed as major problems, e.g.

- comments and prize for a written competition not being sent to the prizewinner until more than twelve months later
- the winner of a junior written competition not being correctly notified of the award, and then, due to the young winner not being present for the announcement, the trophy returned to the sponsor
- an organiser of a written competition also being one of the judges, and also taking out a prize in that same competition

As a result, I would like to add my own comments on this area. Anyone who takes on the organisation of a Written (or Performance) Competition needs to take this responsibility seriously. I will endeavor to get your advertisements in the Newsletter correctly, but this means that all the details must get to me on time. Please check the following -

- Is an entry form required? If so, have you stated this?
- How do competitors get an entry form? Do they need to send a stamped, self-addressed envelope? Have you stated this?
- What is the cost of entry?
- When do entries close? When are winners notified?
- What categories are in this competition?
- Have you included contact details postal and/or phone?
 Please don't assume that I already know these details!

Naturally, you may have too many details and entry requirements for an advertisement. This where an entry form is useful. If you already have an entry form printed for your competition, please send that to me along with your advertisement. In that way, I can add more details if I think it necessary.

For all those organisers and coordinators out there - keep up the great work!





The Legend of Jack Riley

Irish born Jack Riley made his home in the Kosciusko Ranges on becoming manager of the Tom Groggin cattle station in 1884 and soon acquired a reputation as a skilled horseman and stockman.

In 1890 Banjo Paterson visited Jack's high country hut and spent a night with him while Jack told the story of a ride where he daringly pursued a thoroghbred stallion on horseback through rough mountain country. That was the year that the Bulletin published 'The Man from Snowy River' the famous poem which has since become part of Australia's history.

Jack Riley is buried in Corryong cemetery and each year 'The Man From Snowy River' Bush Festival recreates the imagery of the poem with a bush

There's plenty of exciting horse events - Riley's Ride simulates Jack's last days and the legendary 1914 trek from Tom Groggin to Corryong (43 rugged

miles).

The 'Man From Snowy River' Challenge to find the modern 'Man' has real bush action with bareback obstacle, whipcracking, shoeing, brumby catching, and buck jumping over three spectacular days. Add to these a Street Parade, Art & Photography, Family Food Feast, a good old fashioned Bush Dance and re-enactment of Banjo's poem with Geoffrey Graham starring as 'Banjo'

Celebrate with us at Corryong - where the myth began, the spirit of 'Banjo' and Jack Riley live on and the Bush Poetry and Storytelling gain more popularity each year.



WOODFORD 1999

Essay by Marilyn Roberts

This year was my third year performing at the Woodford Folk Festival as a storyteller, and my first as a bush poet. Woodford is the premier event of festivals it is the largest in the Southern Hemisphere and the second largest in the world, it was even showcased for the Millenium world telecasts (though it was rather a shame that the broadcasters weighted their coverage towards the "hippie" element).

But this year at Woodford I learnt more in a few days than I have in my entire time storytelling, because this time the

lessons became more than mere platitudes.

Maybe it was because it was our Millenium year and this was reflected in the general atmosphere of the festival. Maybe it was in sloshing around in mud one really got down to the basics, completely unadorned. Or just maybe it was the right time for me to learn these lessons.

I learnt that the audience was my friend, and that I had nothing to fear from them, everyone there came with good intent. But most importantly I learnt that the words of the poet or storyteller were more important, more immortal than the performer. The words would remain long after the performer had long since gone.

This second part should have been self-evident, in fact it was part of my very introduction to the storytelling show I performed with Helen Fitzgerald and Mala Karim. This was a storytelling and bellydancing spectacular called *In the Steps of Scherehezade*. For although the voice of Scherehezade has long since gone from the Arabian nights her voice still echoes on in her stories and we can still share the wonder, love, laughter, joy and despair her stories bring us.

And as for fear and believing the audience was my friend this was only something I believed in my head and not my heart, and it kept me from joining in with the poets for a long time. But this year with some experience and practice behind me I threw myself into the fray joining in at the poets breakfasts and even camping with the poets on Poets Hill and so made room for those lessons to move from my brain to my heart.

The first lesson came as I walked off the stage shaking with fear

to be replaced by a very novice poet. He got up to read us some of his own poetry, not only was it moving but his beautiful voice was rich and resonant but oh how his hands shook. I have never seen such nervousness. I sat there listening to his beautiful words and sending him positive thoughts trying to let him know we were there just for him, we were his friends. And in that moment it struck me I had that same fear and had never allowed myself to believe that the audience was there just for me and that I could get up and be truly me. What an insight, what I saw for others I could now see was true for me. I now look forward to my next opportunity to really try this out, every opportunity in the future will be a joyous celebration.

My next lesson came almost straight on top of that, because he was followed by a beautiful young girl who had been so inspired by a poem I had recited the day before that she went home and wrote her own poem. As she spoke how much she had enjoyed my performance I took a few moments to bask in her admiration before realising I was merely a conduit, a carrier of an important lesson that someone else had conceived. I could carry word the words of an old fashioned bush poet that could inspire the life of a

hip 17 year old. Words were important.

In that same session a married couple got up to share some words in dedication to their son, he had planned to come to Woodford with them, they had in fact bought his ticket, but he tragically died in a motor vehicle accident. They shared their pain and love with us, and the regrets they will face in the future as they grow older without him. Their words were healing for many in the audience, but especially healing for me, as I too must grow older without my eldest son as he was also killed in a motor vehicle accident. I don't recall their names just as many who saw my performances will not remember my name, but the words and the stories may linger with them for a long time.

I have the privilege as storyteller and poet to keep alive some of man's loftiest thoughts, among friends and without fear I can remind others of the essential goodness of man, in my own way. And that

is something I am learning is a precious gift.

The beautiful parklands beside the Brisbane River were crowded with locals and visitors out enjoying the sunshine and festivities. The afternoon was compered by another 4KQ personality, Greg Newman. Brisbane and local area poets turned out in force, including a contingent from Russell Island. Special mention should be made of young Trent McInnes, who also contested the Open Male section as well as the Junior section. Keep an eye out for mention of this rising young performer.
